WOMEN'S RIGHTS

ACLU has traditionally been at the forefront of efforts to promote equality between the sexes. Long before today's well known and well-established women's rights organizations were formed, ACLU was hard at work: since 1940 it has fought for equal pay for equal work and against prohibitions on the use of contraceptives or on the distribution of birth control information.

EQUAL PROTECTION UNDER THE LAW

The Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment of the U.S. Constitution provides constitutional protection against laws that arbitrarily differentiate on the basis of gender. (Note that this applies only to government actors; private organizations or businesses are outside the constitution's reach). The fundamental principle that applies to sex discrimination cases is one that applies equally to men and to women; that is, a gender-based distinction must (1) serve an "important" governmental objective and (2) must be closely and substantially related to the achievement of that objective. Thus, ACLU can count among its victories a challenge to the automatic preference of men over women as administrators of estates of decedents and a challenge to the exclusion of woman from a military academy. State and federal statutes also prohibit discrimination on the basis of gender by private employers, in public accommodations, and in housing.

RIGHT TO PRIVACY: ABORTION, CONTRACEPTION & PREGNANCY

The Supreme Court has found a right to privacy inherent in the Constitution, and this right has been used to protect many rights relating to women, including abortion and contraceptive use. Although most civil liberties issues that affect women also affect men, the question of reproductive rights presents an obvious exception. Women are directly affected when government imposes restrictions on such reproductive choices as abortion and access to a broad range of birth control measures. ACLU-TN is an active and outspoken proponent of reproductive choice in the courts and the state legislature. (See "Reproductive Freedom")

EMPLOYMENT DISCRIMINATION

Four major federal laws forbid gender discrimination in the workplace: Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, The Equal Pay Act, Executive Order 11246, and the Age Discrimination Act of 1967. Teachers are also protected under Title IX of the Education Amendments of 1972. Of these, Title VII is the most far-reaching. Under this law, an employer can make gender-based hiring decisions only if it can prove that gender, or a requirement that results in candidates of one gender, is a "bona fide occupational qualification." The state Law Against Discrimination similarly prohibits employment discrimination on the basis of gender.

SEXUAL HARASSMENT

Under EEOC guidelines, sexual harassment is defined as:

Unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors and other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature constitute sexual harassment when (1) submission to such conduct is made either explicitly or implicitly a term or condition of an individual's employment, (2) submission to or rejection of such conduct by an individual is used as the basis for employment decisions affecting such individual, or (3) such conduct has the purpose or effect of unreasonably interfering with an individual's work performance or creating an intimidating, hostile or offensive working environment."

To succeed in court, a victim of harassment must show one of three things:

- (1) That s/he was forced to submit to sexual harassment to get or keep her job, even if this was just understood and not explicitly stated;
- (2) That submitting to or rejecting the harassment was the basis for an employment decision that affected the victim; the victim refused sexual advances and was fired, demoted, transferred, or given less favorable conditions; or
- (3) That the harassment itself was intended to or did create an intimidating, hostile or offensive work environment, regardless of whether the person suffered from an unfavorable job action or decision.

Simply being subjected to a hostile, offensive environment is enough to file charges with the EEOC. And, since, the civil rights act of 1991, women can get money damages for

intentional employment discrimination, including sexual harassment

PREGNANCY

It is illegal to discriminate based on pregnancy, childbirth and related medical conditions. The 1978 Pregnancy Discrimination Act requires that pregnant women who are able to work to be treated like any other worker, and that women disabled by pregnancy be treated as any other disabled worker. The PDA has helped many women secure pregnancy-related benefits, including leaves of absence. A woman CANNOT be fired or forced to take unpaid maternity leave because she is pregnant. Pregnancy must be treated as any other medical condition. Those who suspect pregnancy discrimination should file claims with the EEOC and may have sex discrimination claims under Title VII or under the Equal Protection Clause of the 14th Amendment.

While ACLU is interested in employment-related sex discrimination complaints, these complaints do not generally raise issues that warrant ACLU involvement. Such cases usually involve factual disputes rather than issues of law. <u>ACLU is interested in discrimination cases that have the potential to make new law, affect a large number of people, or involve a government employer.</u>

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

ACLU advocates affirmative action. The largest group of Americans to benefit from affirmative action since the passage of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 has been women. Before 1964, women were excluded from many higher paying occupations and professions based on stereotype, custom and law. There were no women police officers, truck drivers, or pilots, and women lawyers and doctors were rare. Despite progress, many barriers to full equality remain:

- □ Men make up 99% of all auto mechanics and carpenters; 98% of all firefighters, 97% of all pilots, and 95% of all welders.
- □ Overall, American women earn only 72% of what men make for comparable work.
- □ Women hold only 3-5% of senior positions in the private sector.

Affirmative action is not unfair, it is not a quota system, and it does not give preferential treatment to unqualified minorities and women. In fact, preferential treatment of whites and males is the norm, and requiring that qualified minorities and women be actively recruited is the only way that previously excluded minorities and women can get a foot in doors previously secured for white men only.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Domestic violence is the most common crime in America today, affecting 3-4 million women a year. The Surgeon General's Office reports that domestic violence is the leading cause of death among women. More than 50 percent of women are battered during their lives, and nearly 2/3 of married women experience physical violence in their marriages. Battering is the single major cause of injury to women.

The Tennessee Domestic Abuse Statute (T.C.A. §36-3-601) offers protection to victims of domestic abuse. When abuse occurs, the victim should immediately call the police, stressing the emergency nature of the situation.

In addition, many civil laws relating to domestic violence, stalking and harassment exist to help victims of domestic violence. Victims should get an Order of Protection, which protects the victim from the abuser. The OP prohibits the abuser from assaulting, harassing, or touching the victim, and can prohibit the abuser from coming to the victim's house. The victim can get a temporary restraining order without an attorney, and without the knowledge or presence of the abuser, immediately following any incident of violence. The temporary order is good for 15 days, at which time the date for a hearing is set, to determine if the temporary restraining order should be made permanent. (T.C.A § 36-3-605)

A victim of domestic violence should immediately go to the office of the Clerk of Court in the county they reside in or the county in which the abuse occurred and fill out the proper forms. A victim may also present any legally sufficient petition to the court. Victims may also call a women's shelter, women's center or the Tennessee Coalition against Domestic and Sexual Violence for directions to local services. Private services such as those listed below provide attorneys to accompany battered partners to these hearings.
